Several recent initiatives have examined the fluxes, pools, and fates of carbon in Scottish marine sediments, with sediments and blue carbon habitats becoming increasingly well characterised. Missing from these initiatives so far is inclusion of water-column carbon inventories, processes, and oceanographic exchanges, which are rarely considered or compared with sediment stores or blue C considerations. We propose a new MASTS working group with the aim to connect these different carbon pools and fluxes across the water column and seabed to better constrain Scotland's marine carbon inventory/cycle, its sequestration dynamics, its vulnerability to

environmental change and identify key knowledge gaps for future research and policy considerations. This working group aims to synthesise connected evidence into a white paper, setting out the current state of knowledge and identifying priorities for future research on Scotland's marine carbon system. If your research/expertise aligns with these ambitions, please come along to the meeting where we will set out the timeframe, aims and objectives of the proposed working group.

Marine & Freshwater Areas of Research Interests- Drop-in

The Scottish Government's Marine Directorate published its [Marine & Freshwater Areas of Research Interest](#) (ARIs) in August 2025. ARIs are formal statements of the evidence gaps and research questions most important to Scottish Government for policy development. They are owned by the Chief Scientific Adviser for Marine and were developed with close involvement from the MASTS community including universities and public bodies, Fisheries Management Scotland, the Scottish Freshwater Group.

The seven ARI themes cover Scotland's marine and freshwater priorities:

- Climate Change & Biodiversity
- Clean Seas & Restoration

- Renewable Energy
- Sustainable Fisheries
- Aquaculture
- Marine Governance & Community
- Intelligent Observation

Climate Change & Biodiversity Crises, Marine Governance & Community, and Intelligent Observation cut across all four sectoral themes, providing an integrating framework rather than sitting as standalone domains.

ARI's require to periodic review as policy priorities shift, new evidence emerges, and the research community provides feedback. The MASTS Annual Science Meeting 2026 provides an opportunity for the MASTS community to converse with Prof Mark Inall (CSA Marine) after the first year of the published ARI's. There is no agenda and no expectation of preparation. The conversation can go wherever is most useful.

Please feel free to approach the CSA Marine during the drop-in to raise any thoughts, reflections, or suggestions regarding the ARIs. The three kinds of contribution are especially valuable for the ARI reflection process are:

- Emerging evidence. Research that is published, in press, or underway and that addresses questions in any of the seven themes. Government does not always have sight of work in progress and knowing where evidence is accumulating shapes how priorities are considered.
- Refinements. Questions in the ARI document that feel imprecise, outdated, or framed in a way that doesn't reflect how the research community approaches the problem. The ARIs were written to be useful to researchers, and where they miss the mark, that is worth knowing.
- Gaps. Research questions not currently in the framework that government should be asking especially those at the interfaces between themes, on methodological challenges that cut across sectors, or on social and economic dimensions of marine management that may be underrepresented.

All contributions feed into the considerations for reviewing the ARI's

The drop-in is open to all conference attendees. Researchers at any career stage are welcome. PGRs and ECRs may find it particularly useful to understand how their work connects to long-term government evidence needs. The ARI themes are intended in part to signal where sustained new research directions are most needed to address Government priorities.
